






Things to Do, Places to Go!







Pine Valley Mountain

The Pine Valley Mountains to our northwest are what geologists call a laccolith. Laccoliths are formed when liquid volcanic magma is injected into rock beneath the earth's surface. The magma cannot break through the earth's surface, so it flows laterally until it evenly cools and hardens.

Exposure of the hardened magma or Pine Valley Mountains takes millions of years to uplift and erode, which eventually gives us this beautiful mountain rainge. Geologists have determined that volcanoes were active in this area for 36 to 5 million years.

The term "laccolith" was established by Grove Carl Gilbert, who was a geologist and an associate of John Wesley Powell. Other laccoliths in Utah include the LaSals, Henry, and San Francisco ranges to name some of the better-known ones. The formation of a laccolith is an example of younger rock forming under older rock instead of the reverse.









Canned Cinnamon Rolls with Cream

These were a hit at the January Potluck!

Ingredients

2 cans Pillsbury "Grands" Cinnamon rolls

1 c. Heavy whipping cream

1 c. Brown sugar

1/2 c. Butter, melted

1 Tbsp. Cinnamon

1/2 c. Chopped pecans (optional)

Icing

1 c. Powdered sugar

1 Tbsp. Butter, softened (or a generous dollop of cream cheese, if you have it)

1 t. Vanilla

2-3 Tbsp. Milk

Icing that came with the rolls

Instructions

- 1. Place cinnamon rolls in a single layer in the bottom of a lightly greased 9 x 13" baking pan. Pour heavy cream around the rolls to make an even layer in the pan.
- 2. Stir brown sugar, cinnamon and warm, melted butter (and nuts, if desired) together. Stir till thoroughly mixed and sugar melts. Heat a few seconds in the microwave if necessary, but don't boil it. You just want the mixture to lose most of its sugary texture. Pour over top of the cinnamon rolls.
- 3. Cover with foil and bake at 350°F for 30 minutes. Uncover and let cool for 10 minutes before adding icing.

Icing

In a small mixing bowl mix together powdered sugar, butter, vanilla and enough milk to make it the desired consistency for drizzling/spreading. Mix in the icing that came with the rolls. Spread or drizzle generously over warm rolls. Serve immediately.

Variations

- 1. You can cut this recipe in half and bake it in an 8" square pan.
- 2. You can also substitute Rhodes frozen cinnamon rolls for the Pillsbury Grands. Place them in the pan leave them covered until they thaw and rise as instructed on the package, then follow the instructions for this recipe. Since these rolls don't come with icing, you may want to make a little extra.
