Greetings, friends and neighbors!

The following is a condensed version of a story told by Glenn Rawson at the Flag Day concert in St. George (printed with his permission). It seemed appropriate for this month. 32 32 33

July the 4th, 1776 was, of course, a most momentous day for every American. The delegates of the Second Continental Congress, having voted to seek independence just two days earlier, now came together on the 4th to declare by the written word their independence from England.

For 20 days during the month of June in 1776, Thomas Jefferson had labored to craft every word of that declaration. Now his written work sat before the committee of the whole Congress as they debated his simple, yet eloquent expressions. For his part, Jefferson sat painfully while the delegates argued, debated and altered his words. Yet, with dignity, the Virginian said nothing. The aging Benjamin Franklin sat by him and attempted to administer a bit of comfort.

John Adams did not sit in silence during the debates. He fought for every word of the Declaration as Jefferson had written it, every expression of its sentiments. In the end, it was accepted for the most part as Jefferson, Adams, and Franklin had proposed it. The changes made in the Declaration of Independence from Jefferson's original "were minor and served to improve it." Well, the Declaration went forth and was eagerly received, and out of its inspired doctrines a new nation emerged.

Thomas Jefferson and John Adams stood by the Declaration of Independence all the rest of their lives.

Many years later, at 12:50 p.m., to the distant sound of celebratory bells pealing in the valley below, the Master of Monticello, Jefferson, departed this mortal life firm in the conviction that he would live again in another.

Far to the north in Quincy, Massachusetts, at 6:20 p.m. "A final clap of thunder...shook the house; the rain stopped and the last rays of sun of the day broke through dark low-hanging clouds, bursting forth with uncommon splendor" just as the great heart of John Adams stopped beating.

The date of passing for both of these noble warrior patriots was July 4, 1826, fifty years to the day of the Declaration of Independence. On the same jubilee day, The Pen and The Voice of Independence were called home by Almighty God.

Fascinating Facts About Hummingbirds

Since almost all of us have hummingbird feeders and love to watch the fascinating creatures, we thought you'd enjoy some fun facts about them. The list turned out to be quite long, so the information will have to be continued into future issues.



- 1. They're nicknamed "hummers."
- 2. Yes, you can have "your" hummers. Hummingbirds choose their favorite locations based on geography, as well as a combination of natural nectar sources and well-placed feeders.
- 3. They have amazing memories. These smart birds can remember every flower and feeder they've visited, as well as how long it takes for a certain flower to refill.
- 4. They can fly thousands of miles every year. In terms of migratory feats, hummers go the farthest of any bird in proportion to body length. The rufous hummingbird has the longest migration of any hummingbird species. Their annual trek covers more than 3,000 miles from Alaska and Canada to southern Mexico.
- 5. They can travel 500 miles in a single go. Some ruby-throated hummingbirds fly 500 miles nonstop across the Gulf of Mexico during both spring and fall migrations. Others will stick to the coast and travel the longer route down the edge of Texas instead.
- 6. Hummers are diurnal, meaning most are awake during the day and sleep at night. That being said, these special birds can migrate regardless of the time of day.
- 7. There are over 350 known hummingbird species. And they are all either in North or South America.
- 8. They love sugar. They can eat more than twice their body weight daily, visiting a hundred or more flowers to do so.
- 9. Don't add dye to their food. It's not a necessary ingredient and there's some debate over whether food coloring could harm birds. To refill your bird feeder, make your own sugar water by boiling four parts water mixed with one part refined white sugar. DIYing instead of buying insures no added colors or chemicals. Other sweeteners, like honey and brown sugar, go rancid faster and can make hummingbirds sick.
- 10. They are attracted to the color red. However, it's a myth that hummingbirds will only feed on red flowers.

Zesty Chicken Enchilada Pasta Salad



Ingredients

- 1 lb chicken breasts
- 2 tbsp taco seasoning
- 2 tbsp cooking oil we use olive oil
- 2/3 cup red enchilada sauce
- 1/3 cup sour cream
- 1/2 lime juiced
- 1 16 oz package pasta cooked
- 1 can black beans drained and rinsed
- 1 can yellow corn drained
- 1/2 cup red onion diced
- 1 jalapeno finely chopped
- 1 can chopped olives optional
- 1/4 cup chopped cilantro to garnish

Instructions

- 1. Remove chicken from packaging, pat dry, and coat with taco seasoning.
- 2. In a large non-stick skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Once the oil is shimmering add the chicken and cook for 5-7 on each side or until the internal temperature reaches 165 degrees.
- 3. Remove the chicken from the pan, let cool for 10 minutes, then chop into 1/2 inch cubes.
- 4. In a large bowl add the enchilada sauce, sour cream and lime juice. Whisk together until smooth.
- 5. Add the chicken, pasta, beans, corn, red onion, jalapeno, and olives (optional) to the bowl with the sauce and stir until the pasta is evenly coated.
- 6. Top with cilantro, refrigerate for an hour until the pasta is cold. Serve.
- 7. This recipe makes a LOT! Great for family reunions or you could reduce the pasta by half.
