


 $\frac{\text{STORM}}{\text{TH}} = \text{Thunder storm (TH <u>under STORM = "thunder storm")}}$ </u>


This month's prize is a \$15 gift card to Dairy Queen.

Our Geology


During the Jurassic period of time, about 200 million years ago, Utah and the North American continent were located closer to the equator and within a dry trade wind belt called an erg. Sandstone remnants of this vast desert can be found in Southern Nevada to Wyoming. This erg eventually covered more than 100,000 square miles and reached a maximum thickness of 2200 feet. (The Sahara Desert of modern times is also known as an erg.)

The sand dunes of the Jurassic period have been preserved as the Navajo Sandstone. The most notable evidence of this windblown sand, silt, and mud can be seen in the large white and pink mountains with the checkerboard mesas evident east of the tunnel in Zion National Park. These mountains are fossilized sand dunes! The geologist's term for the checkboard Mesa is cross bedding, which describes which direction the wind was blowing and at what velocity over and down the dunes to create the checkerboard effect. The cross bed strata can be 10 to 20 feet thick.

Lithification is the term used for the transformation of sand into rock. This process occurred when Southern Utah was flooded, dried out, and flooded again.

The next time you hike the slick rock east of the tunnel in Zion, be grateful that is solid rock rather than the steep, blowing, sandy slopes that it once was.

Because of this fascination, it's only fitting that we celebrate *Wiggle Your Toes Day*. On this fun, and somewhat inane August 6 holiday, we invite little AND otherwise grownup kids to give your little piggy toes some exercise.

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
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
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

White Chocolate Coconut Bundt Cake (Tom Cruise Cake)

This cake is a knock-off of the cake Tom Cruise sends every Christmas to a select list of friends. From allrecipes.com

Ingredients

Cake:

- 3 cups all-purpose flour, plus more for flouring the pan
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 3 cups white sugar
- 1 cup unsalted butter, softened
- 6 large eggs, at room temperature
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon coconut extract
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 cups sweetened flaked coconut
- 1 cup white chocolate chips

Frosting:

- 4 ounces cream cheese, at room temperature
- $1/4\ \text{cup}$ unsalted butter, softened
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups powdered sugar
- 2 tablespoons heavy cream
- 1 ¹/₂ cups sweetened flaked coconut (Optional: toasted)

Directions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350° F. Grease and flour a 10-inch Bundt pan.
- 2. Combine flour, salt, and baking powder in a large bowl; set aside.
- 3. Beat sugar and butter together in a large bowl with an electric mixer on medium until light and fluffy, about 5 minutes. Beat in whole eggs, 1 at a time, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla and coconut extracts and sour cream: beat until combined.
- 4. Add flour mixture and mix until just combined; fold in flaked coconut and white chocolate chips.
- 5. Pour batter into the prepared pan and use the back of a spoon to spread batter evenly.
- 6. Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted into the center of the cake comes out clean, about 1 hour 25 minutes (or less—test for doneness starting at about 1 hour). Allow cake to cool in the pan for 20 minutes before removing to a wire rack to cool completely, about 2 hours more.
- 7. To make the frosting: Add cream cheese, butter, vanilla, and salt to a medium bowl; beat with an electric mixer until smooth. Gradually add powdered sugar and slowly mix until incorporated. Add cream and beat until light and fluffy, about 1 or 2 minutes.
- 8. Frost the top and sides of the cake; lightly press coconut evenly around the outside.

Tip: Finely chop the white chocolate if you don't want caramelized chunks of chocolate in the cake.


Editor's note: I made this cake as directed, and it was delicious, but overdone on the outside. Next time I will bake it at 325° and use an instant-read thermometer to test for doneness (200°) starting at the 1-hour mark.
