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Greetings, friends and neighbors!

As February arrives, communities worldwide prepare for the whimsical tradition of Groundhog Day, rooted in German folklore. Baked Ziti

1 lb. Ziti noodles, cooked as directed on package
1 lb. Ground beef
6 oz. Provolone cheese, sliced
1-1/2 c. Sour cream
6 oz. Mozzarella cheese, shredded
1 onion, chopped as finely as you like
2 Tbsp. Grated parmesan cheese
2 jars Spaghetti sauce



Crumble hamburger and cook with onion till done; drain off fat. Add sauce and simmer for 15 minutes. Grease a 9 X 13 pan and layer as follows: 1/2 of the noodles, provolone slices, sour cream, 1/2 sauce mixture, mozzarella cheese, the rest of the noodles, and the rest of the sauce. Sprinkle parmesan cheese on top. Bake for 30 minutes at 375°.

NOTE: If you leave out the hamburger, this still makes a great vegetarian dish!

This recipe is different from the Ziti recipe published a couple of years ago—give it a try! The friend who recommended it says she gets compliments every time.

Thank you all so much for all the support we have had!



Our Geology

Pieces of petrified wood and large petrified trees are abundant in Utah and in over 750,000 square miles of the Western U.A. The age of much of this petrified wood dates back to the 225 million year old late Triassic era, which is also the beginning of the age of dinosaurs. Many of the pieces of wood and fallen trees are from extinct trees and can be found in the Chinle layer of rock consisting mainly of clay. In the late Triassic era, Utah was covered with trees, some of which were quite large and flowing in streams. This was the period of Pangaea, when continents were closer to the equator and connected, producing an ideal warm climate for plant and animal growth.

Pangaea continued through most of the Jurassic period of time, a time of extensive dinosaur growth and dominance. The next age was the Cretaceous, which brought a moist climate change and a proliferation of plants and some of the largest dinosaurs discovered to date. Petrified plants and trees we find from this era are encased in the Morrison layer of rock, 146 to 138 million years old, and are not all extinct but still exist in some form. Because of the abundant plant life, scientists believe atmospheric oxygen levels during the Cretaceous were up to 32 percent. As humans, we are living at 21 percent.

Wood becomes petrified when minerals from water replace the cells or biological materials of the wood. Much of the petrified wood found here consists of calcite and silicates. The mineral replacement process occurs at a microscopic level and can be accomplished quickly or slowly, depending on the wood's exposure to the elements, mainly water.

The Petrified Forest State Park near Escalante is the best place to view very large and colorful petrified wood. Many areas of Utah require a permit to collect the wood. As residents, we are allowed to collect up to 25 pounds of loose pieces of petrified wood per day, not to exceed 250 pounds per year per person. Never attempt to remove embedded wood from rocks, only collect loose pieces which have already eroded from their rock encasement.



P.S. Don't forget to include a big, bright smile on your face!


How to Celebrate Wave All Your Fingers at Your Neighbor Day




