

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## Greetings, friends and neighbors!

The Dog Days of Summer are here! Ever wondered what this quirky phrase really means? Traditionally, it refers to the hot and humid weather we experience in July and August in the Northern Hemisphere. Back in ancient Greece and Rome, the Dog Days were thought to bring drought, bad luck, and general unrest, with the extreme heat driving both dogs and people a bit mad! These days, we just think of it as the peak of summer's heat and humidity.

So, why do we call it the "Dog Days" of summer? This period of sweltering weather lines up with the heliacal (sunrise) rising of Sirius, the Dog Star. Sirius is part of the constellation Canis Majoris—the "Greater Dog." It's the brightest star in the night sky, which is why it got the nickname Dog Star. The ancient Greeks, Egyptians, and Romans believed that the "combined heat" of Sirius and our Sun caused the scorching summer temperatures. In fact, the name "Sirius" comes from the Ancient Greek word seírios, meaning "scorching."

For the ancient Egyptians, Sirius's rising was a big deal because it marked the start of the Nile River's flood season. They saw the star as a watchdog for this crucial event. On the other hand, the Greeks and Romans weren't as thrilled about Sirius's appearance—they thought it brought drought, disease, and discomfort.

Fast forward to today, and we know Sirius doesn't actually affect our weather. Still, its appearance during the hottest part of summer has kept the lore alive. The exact dates of the Dog Days can vary, but the Old Farmer's Almanac pins them down from July 3 to August 11. This period follows the summer solstice, which is usually when the worst of summer's heat begins.

Even though Sirius is the brightest star in the sky, you can spot it without any fancy equipment. Its longstanding presence in our history and culture shows just how much it has influenced our traditions and stories.

While ancient superstitions suggested a rise in infections during the Dog Days, modern science hasn't found any direct link. But one thing's for sure—we're all looking forward to cooler temperatures and some relief from the summer heat!



Some reminders for the homeowners. The HEOA is responsible for the trees and foliage on the HEOA property which includes common areas and what may obstruct the roads. The homeowners are responsible for the trees and foliage on their own land including any damage to all structures including your own, neighbors or community property. Should any damage occur from a tree on your property you are responsible for it, not the HEOA. You may want to review your own homeowner's insurance or contact your agent to understand your policy better.

The Board has requested the services of an arborist (a specialist in trees) to trim the trees in the community. Our trees are important to us, and we need to do whatever we can to preserve them.

We are still looking for a part-time maintenance person. Stay cool and hydrated.

## French Onion Dip Pasta Salad Recipe

#### INGREDIENTS

- 1 pound pasta: Rotelle, bowtie,
- 1 1/2 cups frozen peas
- 1 medium lemon
- 3/4 cup full-fat plain Greek yogurt
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 1 (1-ounce) envelope onion soup mix, such as Lipton's
- 3/4 teaspoon packed dark or light brown sugar
- 1 small red onion, diced
- 2 large celery stalks, diced
- 1 pint cherry or grape tomatoes, halved
- Freshly ground black pepper
- Kosher salt
- 2 T thinly-sliced fresh chives

#### INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Cook pasta according to package directions until just tender, 10 to 13 minutes. Place 1-1/2 cups frozen peas in a colander and set in the sink. Meanwhile, make the dressing and prepare the remaining ingredients.
- 2. Juice 1 medium lemon into a large bowl until you have 2 tablespoons. Add yogurt, mayonnaise, onion soup mix, and brown sugar. Stir to combine.
- 3. Add onion, celery and tomatoes; stir to combine.
- 4. When the pasta is ready, drain directly over the peas and rinse with cold water to cool. Drain well. Add the pasta and peas to the bowl and toss to coat. Taste and season with kosher salt and black pepper as needed.
- 5. Garnish the pasta salad with the chives.

#### **RECIPE NOTES**

The salad can be made up to a few hours ahead and refrigerated. Reserve 1/2 of the dressing before mixing in the vegetables, pasta, and peas. Stir in the reserved dressing just before serving.

Storage: Refrigerate leftovers in an airtight container for up to 4 days. Makes 12 cups.





#### Anchient Rivers and Land Formation By Karen Brunette

Utah is the second-driest state in the United states. Nevada is the first! None of the rivers flowing in Nevada empty into the ocean, but are internally ddrained into lakes. The Owyhee and Jarbridge rivers in Nevada are the only exceptions, and they flow into Idaho, not the Ocean

Rivers in Utah, both anciend and moden, give us a record of our climate change. The layers of sedimentary rocks laid down by the water flow provide the colorful mountains we enjoy, and the study of the combination of minerals and fossils in those rocks tell us what the climate was doing when the rock layers were deposited. These minerals also tell the story of the mountainbuilding and plate tectonic changes that uplifted and depressed many areas of our state, not once but many times over missions of years.

Volcanic eruptions also played a big part in river diversion and flow. The Colorado river crosses the most landscape barriers in the Western Hemisphere, and the Sevier River is the longest river contained entirely within the State of Utah.






