Cinnamon Roll Cake

Ingredients:

1 box Yellow Cake Mix (and the ingredients to make it BUT replace the water with milk)

1 c. Brown Sugar

1-1/2 sticks Butter, softened

2 Tbs. Flour

1 Tbs. Cinnamon

FOR THE GLAZE:


2 c. Powdered Sugar1 Tbs. Vanilla Extract5 Tbs. Milk



Instructions:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350°
- 2. Make the yellow cake mix according to the directions on the back of the packaging, except use milk instead of water.
- 3. Pour the mixture into a 9" x 13" baking dish that's been sprayed with cooking spray.
- 4. In a small bowl, mix together the softened butter, brown sugar, flour and cinnamon.
- 5. Add dollops of the brown sugar mixture to the top of the cake batter and using a butter knife, swirl the brown sugar mixture into the cake.
- 6. Bake the cake for 30 minutes, or until toothpick comes out clean. Allow to cool for several minutes.
- 7. In a small bowl, whisk together the powdered sugar, milk and vanilla and pour the glaze over the warm (not hot) cake.
- 8. Finally, let it cool, and serve at room temperature.






Around the Neighborhood!


We're sorry to report that Richard Palfreyman, who lived on Scenic Circle passed away on December 24. He and his little dog were a common sight around the neighborhood.



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Rocks, and More Rocks!

Did you know? Rocks and more rocks are all around us; black, blonde, red, orange, purple rocks.

Most of these rocks are loaded with patterns of ancient life forms such as fossil trails on invertebrate animals (no spines), leaves of trees millions of years old, and bits and pieces of fossilized plant stems and wood. Our rocks tell the history of earth's changes. The study of our rocks will tell us the age of each rock formation through their radioactive isotopes.

Several years ago, a neighbor found a flat round rock that looked like a fossilized cow pancake. Our dinosaur museum lab described it as a septarian nodule. When broken open, it contained veins of crystals (like a geode).



Many rocks from our neighborhood canyons have petrified tree pieces; not as beautiful as a piece of petrified wood, but a surprise to find!

A very small portion of our world is known with scientific accuracy. An ecologist once told me that 99% of all life that has ever existed on earth is extinct! The remains of that life can be found in our rocks; from bacteria to plants to insects to animals of other times.














National Chopsticks Day is February 6



Put away the forks and spoons, for today is National Chopsticks Day, a February 6 holiday. They may or may not be new to you. But, for about 1/4 of the world's population, chopsticks are the eating utensils of choice for every meal. Like western children, Asian children quickly learn to use chopsticks, and quickly become adept at using them. To them, forks are an odd utensil.

Chopsticks can be made of wood, bamboo, plastic, bone, fine china, or metal.

In China, they are called "Kuaizi", which means "quick little bamboo fellows."

Chopsticks have been in use for over 5,000 years. For comparison, forks were not used in England until 1611. Chopsticks originated in China and are used in virtually all Asian cultures. How their use spread to other countries is not known.

To participate in National Chopsticks Day, use chopsticks for all of your meals. Chances are, you will eat Chinese or other Asian food with your chopsticks. But, you can eat any food with chopsticks today.

To make this day really special, use your chopsticks on a homemade made Chinese recipe.

National Chopsticks Day Trivia and Fun Facts

- Chopsticks preceded the fork for thousands of years.
- Over 45 billion pairs are used annually in China alone. Of course, many are disposable, one-time use.
- Most chopsticks are wooden, making them eco-friendly.
 And, you can recycle them in a composter along with yard waste.
- A pair of wooden chopsticks come together. When unseparated it is a sign of togetherness.
- The word "Chopsticks" in the Chinese language means "quick little bamboo fellows".
- They vary in design. For example, Japanese chopsticks are shorter than their Chinese counterparts. And, they have a sharper point.
- If you use them for all of your meals, you have a slightly higher risk of osteoarthritis than when using a fork, knife, and spoon.

Chopsticks Etiquette: Improper use is in poor taste. And it can even be impolite or insulting.

- Don't insert them upright into your food. It's an insult.
- It's okay to stab a piece of food with them.
- Don't point at people with them.
- Don't suck or chew on the ends of your chopsticks.
- They are not drumsticks. Don't drum with them.

News from the Board

We are into the dog days of winter and the temperatures are very cold out there especially at night! If you are elderly, in poor health or otherwise in need of help in some way don't hesitate to call the front office or reach out to a neighbor or a friend! We are all in this together. \bigcirc

As your 2024 -2025 Board of Directors, we have been focused this year on repairing and rebuilding some of the infrastructure around here. We greatly appreciate your patience as we finish a few things up.

We have talked previously about the fact that we are installing a set of gate valves that will segment the park into geographic districts that might allow us to control the water more efficiently. The idea being that then we will be able to turn the water off in portions of the park without having to shut it off for everyone.

We are hopefully in the last stage of that project, and we are now installing what we hope to be our last valve which will control the Cottonwood Lane portion of the park. We already installed one valve for Cottonwood but when we got into the project, we discovered we required a second valve so we hope to finish that up by the time you read this.

Next we turn to electricity. Rocky Mountain Power is coming out on Tuesday January 28th, 2025 to replace the ancient electric transformers that have been in place here since day one or soon thereafter. By the time you read this that should also be complete. Unfortunately, that will require that the power be turned off for the whole park for about 7 hours.

A couple more projects you should see completed this 1st quarter are:


- 1. On the sprinkler project in Memorial Park what should we have planned for late February.
- **2.** An asphalt replacement project for the Scenic Circle portion of the park. That should also be completed in February.


