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

### Cheese & Herb Monkey Bread

### **Ingredients:**

2 cans 16.3 oz each refrigerated biscuit dough

1/2 cup butter melted

2 cups shredded mozzarella cheese

1 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1/4 cup fresh parsley chopped

1/4 cup fresh basil chopped

2 cloves garlic minced

1 tsp dried oregano

1 tsp dried thyme

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp black pepper



### **Instructions:**

- 1. Preheat your oven to 350°F. Grease a bundt pan with non-stick cooking spray.
- 2. Open the cans of biscuit dough and cut each biscuit into quarters.
- 3. In a large bowl, combine the shredded mozzarella cheese, grated Parmesan cheese, chopped parsley, chopped basil, minced garlic, dried oregano, dried thyme, salt, and black pepper. Mix well.
- 4. Dip each piece of biscuit dough into the melted butter, then roll in the cheese and herb mixture. Layer the coated dough pieces evenly in the prepared bundt pan.
- 5. Bake for 30-35 minutes, or until the bread is golden brown and cooked through.
- 6. Remove the monkey bread from the oven and let it cool in the pan for about 10 minutes. Carefully invert onto a serving plate. Serve warm and enjoy!

#### **Notes**

This pull-apart bread is perfect for sharing, whether it's for a party appetizer, a game day snack, or just a fun family meal. Enjoy the gooey cheese, fragrant herbs, and soft, buttery bread in every bite.



### March 5 is Cheese Doodle Day

Are your fingers turning a delicious, finger-licking orange? They certainly should be! Today is National Cheese Doodle Day. On this fun holiday, you don't have to limit yourself to just cheese doodles. You can also enjoy cheese balls, cheese curls and cheese puffs. And, aside from the traditional cheese flavor, there are other flavors to enjoy. One thing is certain, every variety you can find is guaranteed to leave you licking your orange fingers. Try them all as you celebrate this holiday.

In 1948, Morrie Yohai, president of Old Country Foods in the Bronx in New York City is credited with creating cheese doodles. He invented them by accident! His company was trying to make a new cornmeal-based animal feed. The equipment malfunctioned, accidentally putting the ingredients under high pressure. Out of the machine, came a light, airy and tubular-shaped tidbit. It was the first cheese doodle. They then experimented with various combinations of the recipe before coming up with the perfect cheese flavor. Shortly afterward, when it hit the market, it was an immediate hit. The Old Country Foods Company experimented and marketed other flavors, too.

Note: There are a few others who claim to have created them. But, they were all at later dates.

Old Country Foods sold the brand and the recipe to Borden company, and later to Wise Foods. Wise Foods sells it today under the name Cheez Doodles.

Eventually, other food manufacturers came out with competing products which they carried under their own product names. In the 1950s, Cheetos surpassed Cheese Doodles in popularity.

Over 15 million pounds of this light and airy snack are manufactured annually.

Famous chef Julia Child was a cheese doodle superfan.

You can make them at home. An internet search will provide you with the recipe. Get the kids involved when you make homemade cheese doodles.





### The American Robin: A Sign of Spring

There's something special about spotting the first robin of the year. That cheerful *cheep-cheep* call and bright brick-red chest feel like nature's way of telling us that winter is finally loosening its grip. As one of the earliest signs of spring, the American Robin brings the promise of warmer days, blooming flowers, and green lawns ahead.

Robins are hardworking birds, often seen bounding across yards or standing tall with their beaks tilted upward, as if surveying their surroundings. They have a habit of flicking their tails downward several times when they land—one of their many charming quirks. While we often associate them with backyards and gardens, these adaptable birds thrive in a variety of habitats, from city parks and fields to forests, pastures, and even tundra.

Males and females look similar, though males tend to have a blacker head and slightly richer coloration. Juvenile robins can be a bit tricky to identify at first, with their speckled chests and mottled backs. But if you spot that telltale reddish tinge on their chest, you can be sure you're looking at a young robin growing into its signature colors.

Aside from their beauty and delightful songs, robins play an important role in the environment. They help control insect populations by eating large quantities of worms and insects, making them natural pest managers. When they feast on berries, they unknowingly plant new trees by spreading seeds through their droppings. And because they are so numerous, they serve as an important food source for predators like snakes and hawks, keeping the ecosystem in balance.

So, the next time you hear that familiar song or see a robin hopping across your lawn, take a moment to appreciate this industrious little bird. Whether it's the first robin of spring or part of a winter flock feasting on berries, these feathered friends are a wonderful reminder of nature's rhythms and the changing seasons.


